Application FAQs

January 15, 2025: Application Deadline

Note: The OUAC will continue to process applications received after this date and distribute them to the Ontario universities; however, specific university deadlines will apply.

May 29, 2025

The latest date all Group A applicants who submitted their application by the January application deadline can expect a response from an Ontario university. This includes an offer of admission, a refusal or a deferral, once additional information is received.

June 2, 2025

The earliest date a Group A applicant may be required to respond to an Ontario university offer of admission and give a financial commitment (e.g., registration deposit, residence deposit). All other admission-related elements, including scholarships, other forms of student assistance or financial incentives, and offers of residence, are considered part of the offer of admission. Therefore, a student may accept these other offers before June 2, 2025, but Ontario universities will not compel a student in any way to make a decision before this date.

▶ <u>Application Fees</u>

1. Base Application Fee: \$156

- For your initial 3 program choices.
- Required of all applicants.

2. Additional Choice Fee: \$50/choice

- For each additional program choice beyond your first 3 (e.g., if you add 2 additional university choices, you must pay \$100 in addition to the base application fee).
- Notes:
 - There is no fee for replacing a program choice with another program choice at the same university.
 - If you amend your application to withdraw a program choice at 1 university and add a program choice at a different university, you will be charged \$50 for the new program choice.

 You may apply to as many Ontario universities as you wish; however, you are limited to a maximum of 3 program choices at any 1 university (including its affiliates). Some universities may further limit the number of programs you can apply to.



➤ Applying to Out-of-province Universities

The OUAC assists the following out-of-province universities with collecting academic data for Ontario high school students who have applied through the OUAC:

- Acadia University
- Bishop's University
- The University of British Columbia
- Concordia University
- Dalhousie University

- McGill University
- Saint Mary's University
- Simon Fraser University
- The University of Victoria

Students who apply to these out-of-province universities can authorize the universities to request their academic information from the OUAC. To authorize them, the applicant must include their 11-digit OUAC Reference Number on the university's application form. In all cases, the 11th digit should be "0".

Normally, the OUAC Reference Number contains 10 digits, beginning with the current year (4 digits) followed by 6 digits (e.g., 20XX999999). If a university asks for your 11-digit OUAC Reference Number, add a 0 (zero) at the end of your 10-digit number (e.g., 20XX9999990).

This automated transfer of academic data greatly reduces the workload for high schools by eliminating the need to prepare and mail hard-copy transcripts.

* An OUAC reference number is only generated once a student has applied to post-secondary programs in Ontario. If you are <u>not</u> applying to programs in Ontario, you will need to request your transcript be sent.
